

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RECTOR'S REPORT

Dear Friends,

As we reflect on a year of unprecedented challenge, we have so much to thank God for. The pages that follow are only a snapshot of what God has been doing amongst us, here at Saint James, but they tell a story of "endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Thess 1:3).

Back in September, we launched the year with our Vision@Home event, (an innovation in itself!) with chocolate brownies and a house key delivered to people's homes. The theme: 'church as a family.' The message: we want Saint James to be 'a place to belong' – for everyone.

Families, however, are messy. We rub up against each other. We have to learn to say sorry. We have to learn to forgive. So, we've spent time in our Sunday sermons and in Growth Groups looking at what the Bible says about that. And we've grown in the likeness of Christ and closer to one another along the way.

We've also been getting to know new faces. God has been so kind in providing for our needs and we are blessed to have an outstanding new staff team. I hope you will soon feel that you are getting to know them. In recent weeks we have had the bittersweet privilege of saying farewell to Welshman Dube, who has returned to Johannesburg after finishing his training with us. We will be praying for him and watching his next phase of ministry with interest.

It hasn't been easy. Lockdown has forced us to adapt not just to new technology and new patterns of meeting together. The relentless innovation and constant decision-making have been exhausting, but having to think more about 'church as a family' and has been healthy for us.

As we work our way out of lockdown, it will take time for people to recover spiritually and for people to reconnect with church. We'll need to be patient with one another and we'll need to look out for those who need encouragement to come back. The need for love and humility in our relationships with one another has never been greater.

Indeed, I hope you'll find a good dose of humility in the reports that follow. After all, some of what we've tried hasn't worked. And there's a lot to do and a long way to go as we rebuild post-COVID. So, this not an exercise in self-congratulation. Rather, it's an opportunity to thank God. We are an ordinary group of people, but our heavenly Father has kept us, guided us and provided for us every step of the way. And through the hope that we have in his son Jesus Christ, he has enabled us to endure.





REPORT

As Paul reflects on his ministry to the Thessalonians, he says 'we were delighted to share with you not only the gospel of God but our lives as well.' 1 Thess 2:8.

In a year in which many of our normal outreach events and programmes have been disrupted, it has been a delight to see us growing as a church in our everyday evangelism. Despite us being locked in our homes, many of us are more connected to our neighbours than ever before.

Someone shared with me recently that everyone on her street now stops to speak to one another. This is wonderful because that is how the gospel will spread through our networks: as the good news of Jesus is shared in the everyday of our relationships.

Over the past year we've been encouraged by the hard-work and commitment of so many at Saint James Football Club to keep coaching and games happening. Our hopes and prayers for the club are that God might provide more Christian coaches and that we might make the most of the brilliant links between the club

and the church to share our hope in Jesus with those who don't know him.

Of course, the pandemic has brought plenty of challenges and we've had to find creative ways to get the gospel out in our community. Our Explore courses have happened on Zoom. We hosted our carol services in the Tesco car park and on YouTube. We shared our hope through homemade craft videos. And we told the story of Christmas and Easter through trails in Fulmer village and on the common.

In all this, what matters most is not programmes, but people. That is why, over and above events and courses, we want to emphasise the 'ordinary' work of evangelism as we share life and speak about Jesus with our neighbours. It has been a joy to see a handful of people come to trust in Jesus as their Lord and saviour. Each time we've seen this happen, as it did in Thessalonica, in the first century, it has been through friendships, as we share both the gospel and our lives with those around us.














REPORT

The last 12 months have produced unique challenges for us in being a church where everyone is connected and cared for. Certainly at the start of the first lockdown there was a desire to both proactively care for one another as a church family and to reach out to those in the community around us that led to a flurry of activity. However, as the months have gone on the weariness has inevitably increased, along with Zoom fatigue and we have settled into new, more isolated, patterns of life. Despite this the Pastoral Care Team have continued to reach out physically and virtually to many in our church. This has been supplemented with the addition of "Cake Ministry" in which people have received baked goods, greeting and prayer on the doorstep.

Undoubtedly lockdown life has taken a huge toll on our mental and emotional health. Many people have struggled in their marriages, carers have been put under even more pressure and many of us have found ourselves a little bit more on edge. There has been a wonderful level of care extended through the Growth Group network, as well as some specific webinars addressing "God's Care in Dementia" and "Marriage Matters", both of which were encouragingly attended.

One of the hardest things has been seeing how people have struggled spiritually in the last year. Many have found engaging with ministry online unappealing or technically difficult. However, others have joined Saint James or become more involved. We have run four Connect courses since October 2020 with around 50 people attending. It has been a joy to see people for the first time "in the flesh" as we have started to meet again on Sundays, a number of whom have connected with Saint James virtually during the last year.

Our great desire is to meet together in person Sunday by Sunday. As someone who arrived this year I am excited about meeting many of the church family for the first time! REPORT

Maturity is about a culture in which we are growing together in God's word by the power of his Spirit.

One of the key places in which this is expressed in the life of our church is Growth Groups. We are convinced that as God's word is preached on a Sunday his voice is heard. And his voice always brings transformation and life! We've been trying to live out that reality as our groups meet week by week. We've prayerfully applied what God has been saying to us through the books of Ruth, James, John and more recently 1 Thessalonians. We've also thought about what it is to be a church family and how we might be better equipped to share the gospel with others.

During lockdown especially, Growth Groups have been a vital source of community, prayer and spiritual encouragement. It was a real joy for me to visit each of the groups and hear how God has been at work in them over this challenging year.

However, whilst Growth Groups are obvious and visible, most of the discipleship in our church family is organic and hidden. It might be people reading the Bible 1:1, or meeting in Prayer

Triplets, or walking side-by-side with one another through the stresses and strains of the Christian life. And of course, much of our discipleship takes place in the home, which is why we want to keep equipping families for whole-life worship.


Life in lockdown would not have been the same without our Daily Devotionals! Many have appreciated starting the day with God's word and prayer. And we've run some one-off events and courses as well. In January, to help us

through the challenge of lockdown in mid-winter, we ran 'Covid on my Mind' with Helen Thorne. And in March we ran three 'Parenting -Rooted in Grace' evenings. We've also launched a virtual bookstore (saintjames.org.uk/books), and we've re-stocked the bookshop in the Saint James Centre; we're thinking all the time about how to get useful resources in to people's hands.

REPORT

In September 2020, when we thought the pandemic was drifting into the past, we started meeting in-person again and put in place teams to oversee car parking, welcoming, and stewarding, and of course we had a fantastic Tech Team to take care of the livestreaming. But then we went into lockdown again, then reopened before Christmas, then another lockdown, then reopening again! We've needed to adapt, to combine teams, and to adjust to new guidelines along the way.

Thank you to everyone for your understanding and patience, and for the grace of God allowing us to adapt and be flexible in unexpected circumstances.

So, how do you serve in lockdown? Well, you don't need to be in a team or on a rota. Serving one another has involved phone calls, cards in the post, text messages, doing someone's shopping, helping with home-schooling, running errands, dropping meals round, and plenty of cake. And, of course, where would we be without Zoom?! Well done to everybody who has mastered the technology, and used it to connect with others, to encourage them, and pray together. Even in a pandemic, or perhaps because of it, we've seen people serving others in ways we wouldn't normally have thought of.

So much care has been expressed – and much of it will have gone unnoticed. But as the body of Christ, we belong together, and we have the joy and privilege of serving together - "there are many parts, but one body." (1 Corinthians 12:20)

Many of us have appreciated the book Serving without Sinking - an easy read, which opens our eyes to how we can serve with joy because of who we are in Christ and how our service is in response to all that God has done for us.

In order to resource our various ministries, we need a strong pipeline of future leaders. It's essential, therefore, that we are training and equipping men and women for gospel ministry. To that end (and building on last year), a second group drawn from across the church has been meeting with Matt on Wednesday evenings for EQUIP. We've been deepening our grasp of key doctrines and clarifying the principles of gospel ministry and how they apply to our vision to see every life transformed. We've spent time in the Bible; time in discussion – and built relationships along the way. (And we persevered with it on Zoom...!) Matt is looking forward to another cohort starting in September.

REPORT

Life in Fulmer during a global pandemic has been challenging, encouraging and occasionally distressing. God continued to be at work amongst us with opportunities to share the gospel creatively in the village, church members growing in their Christian faith, people coming to faith, and some stepping out in faith to serve in new ways. We have also experienced considerable loss: our freedom to meet in person, the passing of several congregation members, as well as family members, and the sense of isolation that comes with social distancing.

Some highlights:

- A new member of the church coming to faith during lockdown, now connected into church life.
- Zoom coffee after Sunday Gatherings, enabling deepening relationships with one another and with Jesus, through chat, prayer and Bible study, bringing a sense of one church.
- Private Prayer and Midweek Holy Communion, providing space to draw close to God in scripture and prayer.

- Online Carols by Candlelight offering an atmospheric presentation of the Christmas story and gospel message, enjoyed and shared globally.
- ► The Christmas Nativity Trail, appreciated by many Fulmer families and others, followed by an Easter Trail, enabling opportunities to proclaim the gospel in a child-friendly way, with a goody bag for all. Many ribbons were tied to the Christmas tree and the cross, symbolising prayers made to God at the end of each trail.
- Pastoral care: church members going above and beyond, making phone calls, knocking on doors, offering love, cake, care and prayer to church and non-church.
- People stepping up to serve: pastoral care, tech on Sundays, artwork, building story trail boards, stewarding, hosting Zoom, keeping us COVID-safe, etc.





News of the birth of Jesus brought great joy to many families following the Christmas Story Trail in Fulmer. The singing of Away in a Manger and Hush Little Baby could be heard across the village as the excitement built up when discovering the Christ child in the lowly stable. The trail ended with a message from wise man "Daf" (a new pastor) and the opportunity to say a prayer while putting a ribbon on the Christmas tree.'

Partnering with parents to grow young disciples...



GOAL

... so that our children are rooted and growing



Lockdown has had a big impact on ministry to children this year. With the constant start stop of kids groups and the restrictions in church, it has meant most families have decided to stay away from church. Sadly, this has made it difficult to engage and build relationships with families.

In God's kindness lockdown has brought new areas of ministry and therefore unique opportunities to teach children. Weekly zooms helped children to stay connected in lockdown as well as creating room for discussions following on from the online kid's lessons. Our partnership with the local GX school has continued all year with the provision of weekly online assemblies. These have been received really well. Online assemblies has enabled us to reach out and support other schools in the surrounding area too. The introduction of support groups enabled us to prepare

well for the relaunch of Tiny Tots. A team was established and equipped so that church mums would feel confident in building relationships so that they could share the gospel. Even with restrictions in place, the launch has been successful in seeing over 15 local and brand new families attending the weekly group.

Coming alongside parents to disciple children will continue to play a part in the kids work going forward so that together we are growing young disciples of our children. As things start to open up again the kids work will see a new structure to Sundays and mid-week activities which are aimed at, through God's grace, laying the foundations of faith so that they are rooted and growing. Children on a Sunday are showing hunger to learn which has been evident in their prayers and questions and has encouraged the leaders, leaving us praising God.



REPORT

Since my youth, O God, you have taught me, and to this day I declare your marvellous deeds – Psalm 71:17.

If there is one word to summarise this last year of youth ministry it would be: resilience.

It's been a hard year. There's been so much change and confusion. Exams have been cancelled, algorithms have changed grades, exams have been reinstated, masks are to be worn, no masks are to be worn, home-schooling, in-person schooling, virtual schooling. There's been *a lot* of disruption in the lives of our young people. And I think they've shown incredible resilience.

Of course that doesn't mean that it's all been plain sailing – many of our parents know that from experience. But on the whole I'm grateful to God for how our young people have kept going through the pandemic.


We kept gathering in person as much as we were able to within the guidelines. It's good to keep Sundays for corporate worship and Christian activities. Having a slot every week where we could meet together has been so precious. And our young people kept coming. There were, of course, some who couldn't join us because they were shielding – but I've been amazingly encouraged at how they were keen to join in via Zoom with what was happening in the Saint James Centre. We've read the Bible, prayed together, listened to worship songs, and by God's grace, we've gotten to know Jesus a bit better. Now that restrictions are lifting it's a joy to see more of our young people coming back each week to join in with in-person groups again.

This highlights a broader aim of our youth ministry, revealed beautifully in Psalm 71:17. We want to grow young disciples of Jesus who are resilient. That is, young people whose faith lasts a lifetime (and beyond!). It's my prayer that in 20, 30, or 40 years' time our young people will look back on their time in our groups and say: since my youth, O God, you have taught me, and to this day I declare your marvellous deeds.













REPORT

In recent weeks we've been wrestling with safeguarding, church database, new marriage legislation, ministry planning, Covid risk assessments, HR processes, and much more.

Over the last 12 months, I'm enormously grateful to Simi, Tara, Hazel, Rachel and Kirsty for juggling the challenges of lockdown and with their work responsibilities. God has been kind to us as he's sustained us.

In the points that follow you'll get a sense of what we've been able to move forward and where we think the challenges lie as we look ahead. We're enormously grateful for your prayers.

FINANCE

BACKGROUND

The General Fund represents the "pot" available for the day to day running of all the ministries here at Saint James. All church family giving, that is not for a specific purpose, goes into this fund; all the staff costs and other general running costs of all our ministries are paid for using this giving. Any legacies that are not made for specific purposes also pass into this fund (which can vary dramatically in both size and frequency), as do the other, much smaller, sources of income including the bookshop, increases in the value of any investments, church run events and fees for weddings and funerals.

OVERVIEW OF 2020

We started the year with a PCC approved general fund budget deficit of £147k and as a result of God's provision through the generous giving of the Church family we ended up reporting a surplus of £18k.

The "headline" total income figure of £1,244k was 16% up on the 2019 equivalent income of £1,075k. However, the 2020 headline figure included £343k of legacy income; the equivalent figure for 2019 being zero. Excluding legacies, the total income fell by 16%.

The income received directly from the members of the church family, again excluding legacies, fell 13% from £987k in 2019 to £854k in 2020. A major factor in this reduction, but one difficult

to measure accurately, was the impact of COVID 19. This resulted in increased financial pressures on personal incomes and severely restricted the ability to physically meet together to worship with the associated reduction in collection related income.

The PCC decided that the main legacy received during 2020 should not be used to finance the on-going running costs of the parish, but should be put aside for a yet to be defined project that would serve and enable our overall vision as a church. Hence, £286k was transferred into the Church Growth Fund.

Due to the strong performance of the stock exchange during 2020 there was a recognised gain of £13k on the holding value of our index related investment (2019: gain of £10k).

Total expenditure for the year at £948k was 9% lower than 2019 (£1,042k). The "core" expenditure of running all our ministries and other activities (excluding outside giving) at £840k was down 10% from £936k in 2019. This was due to a combination of good cost control, the COVID 19 impact of closing the various church buildings and various staff vacancy gaps that arose during 2020. The parish share contribution of £219k is included within this figure and was up 2% on 2019. In 2020 the grants to organisations outside the church (allocated by the mission Committee) totalled £84k, down 9% on the 2019 equivalent and represented 10% of the budgeted underlying voluntary income.





FINANCE

OVERVIEW OF 2021 TO DATE

We started 2021 with a PCC approved general fund budget deficit of £178k. Due to the very encouraging response to the "Giving at Saint James" packs that went out during February and the associated sermon given by Matt, the latest forecast deficit is down to £126k. As the actual costs are broadly in line with the budget, the increase is primarily due to the nearly 40 members of the church family who have increased their regular giving.

Further updates will be given to the church family during the remainder of this year.

Please pray that we would all be giving joyfully and sacrificially to enable the work of the gospel at Saint James.


OUR BUDGET FOR 2021

- We need to increase our regular giving to meet the budgeted shortfall.


